

## Work to start on Glendoe

TENANTS in Glendoe Terrace's six blocks have been officially advised that work to refurbish their homes with new kitchens, bathrooms, new flooring, rewiring and new decking on the communal landings will start early next year with the replacement of their windows.

But the rest of the modernisation programme on the 62 local authority flats will not start until 2010 and could take until 2015. The other 10 of the flats in the six blocks are privately owned and are not included in the refurb.

Tenants will have to move out for five months as their maisonette-type homes, which were built in the 1960s, are brought up to standard. The local tenants' association is delighted that their homes are not to be demolished. They were closely involved in deciding what work should be done and a door-to-door survey was carried out.

## Crime down — a bit — and festive cheer up, while ticket office concern rumbles on

VANDALISM in Merkinch was significantly down over the last couple of months, Community Beat Officer Connie Sinclair told the November meeting of the Community Council.

September and October had seen a total of 44 cases reported compared to 61 for the same two months last year. Generally speaking the number of calls to the area was down around 10%, and disturbances were also down in October. Also call-outs to the fire brigade over the firework season had been fewer.

The bad news was that assaults, thefts and domestic disturbances were all up this month, though over the two-month period assaults were lower than last year. Regarding the eight thefts, all took place within houses with the suspect being known to the complainer and one person is thought to be responsible for three of the thefts. Of the 10 domestic incidents reported to the police, seven have been reported to the courts, she said.

There were fewer reports of children and youths messing about with BB guns. The owner of Price Busters on Grant Street where some of these "toys" were being sold had been reported

to the Procurator fiscal under the Violent Crime
Reduction Act of 2006 which covers the sale of
replica weapons having the appearance of being
real.

PC Eddie MacKenzie, who is new on the Merkinch beat, was introduced to members (see opposite page).

■ There was still some unhappiness over the way the old ticket office was being dealt with. Dell McClurg and Anne McCreadie, who ran it for many years on behalf of the Community Council said they felt they had been taken over.

There had been no vote at any meeting they had been at and no minutes of any vote to close the sub-group dealing with the project or to close the Number 2 account.

Those who had been present at the meeting when it was agreed to close the sub-group and the account said there had been no dissension.

It was pointed out that Gary Wells, the chairman, and treasurer Brian Cain were now handling the matter. The building was now cleared for a proper survey to be done, background heating was on to dry it out. The surveyor's report was not yet in, so it was not known what needed to be done.

■ The old broken-down boiler in the Community Centre had been taken out and it was hoped that a new one could be in by the end of the following week (21st November) or earlier as they had 90 youngsters coming for the Cello Day as well as other classes and events. Otherwise things were going very well at the centre.

There was lots of enthusiasm for the Christmas Parade and festival (see page 5) which was going to be a great event and they had a lot of good bookings for next year. Members agreed to donate £100 towards the winter festival—they heard that the reindeer alone would cost over £1000.

- South Kessock Residents Association are holding their Santa's Grotto on Saturday 13th December.
- Highland Council had done nothing about restoring the small corner of Abban Street and Lochalsh Road to Merkinch, members heard. The matter had been deferred until it could be seen whether the Park Community Council was to be re-established. But this had fallen through.
- The next meeting is on Thursday 15th January in the Community Centre.

## Dangers of bark in playparks

AT the most recent meeting of Merkinch Healthy Network in the Community Centre one of the many topics discussed was the dangers of using bark in children's play areas. Those present, all representatives of official health and social work agencies as well as voluntary groups in the sector, heard that drug-users needles were too easily lost in such a surface. There was considerable discussion on the problem and needle exchange schemes etc.

Other topics discussed included:

- AA group for young people has been set up (For the Right Reasons).
- Harder to get appointments at Osprey House for alcohol problems than it used to be. Anyone turning up with children will be turned away. Crèche needed.

- More joined-up working, important to make links between agencies.
- Duplication of services, some people/ families have many agencies helping them leads to confusion. We should all ask if we need to be here, who is best placed to help. Helpful to have a care package coordinated by one person. We all need to look outside our boundaries.
- For the Right Reasons reaching people who are not engaging with other services, want to set up a retreat house.
- Group is needed for young people misusing, to replace BLAST, very few resources for young people.
- Child care is a huge problem for parents misusing substances who are trying to access services.

## Greenspace review an exciting year



"WE have made an incredible number of improvements in the past year," Greenspace chairperson Ali Locke told the AGM at the end of October. Among the achievements were:

- · Refurbishment of the play park at Benula Rd,
- · Resurfacing of Coronation Rd,
- · Improvements at the Corbett Centre gardens,
- · Clean up of the riverbank at Friar's Shott,
- · Hard landscaping of shrub beds in Grant St.
- Provision of hanging baskets at Glendoe Terrace.
- Supporting other groups in the Corbett centre gardens.

The main focus was on the West Field and Merkinch Local Nature Reserve was formally designated on 28th November 2007, the 50th in Scotland and the only one in the Highlands.

It covers an area of some 54 hectares which include mud flats/sand banks out to the low water mark, marsh land, lagoons, woodland and open green areas and abundant wildlife.

All of this came about as a result of Merkinch Greenspace setting up a steering group to work in partnership with Highland Council, British Waterways, Scottish Natural Heritage, Merkinch Partnership, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, Green Inverness and the local community.

Some of the first achievements were the installation of two monoliths, one at the Caledonian Canal and one at the Kessock Road entrance, the installation of carved wooden benches designed by Merkinch Primary pupils, and the installation of dog bins as well as a major litter clearance.

#### The Near Future

An interpretive plan is being commissioned for the reserve and a species and habitat survey

is in the process of being carried out. "We are also in the embryonic stages of looking at building an information centre on the Reserve," said Mr Locke. A celebration day for the LNR is planned for Saturday 13th June, 2009.

## Latest work at nature reserve

This is designed to allow the disabled access to the reserve as well as providing an all-weather, safer surface to walk on.

Elsewhere, some may have noticed the clearance work on the river bank at Friars Shott.



## You and your health



#### Colitis can be nasty

ULCERATIVE colitis is a superficial inflammation of the large intestine which results in ulceration and bleeding. The patient experiences alternating periods with no or few symptoms and periods with frequent stomach pains and diarrhoea mixed with pus, blood and mucus.

The exact cause of ulcerative colitis is unknown. It is not caused by bacteria. However, hereditary, infectious and immunological factors have been proposed as potential causes.

The condition can lead to thinning of the bowels and sufferers have an increased risk of developing a certain type of cancer.

The symptoms of ulcerative colitis are: Periods with diarrhoea, mixed with pus, blood and mucus which alternate with few or no symptoms.

When the colitis is active, the patient often has mild stomach pains, loss of appetite, weight loss and sometimes a fever. The symptoms vary according to the extent of the disease.

The consequences of ulcerative colitis are: Malnutrition, inflammation of joints, eves and skin and an increased risk of cancer of the colon. In rare cases life-threatening internal bleeding can occur.

Flare-ups cannot be prevented but the severity of the attacks can be reduced. It is important that affected people follow preventative treatments carefully.

Severe, acute flare-ups may confine the patient to bed. When the symptoms ease they should be able to resume their normal activities.

Most patients with ulcerative colitis do not need to restrict their diet as changes in diet have little effect on ulcerative colitis.

Ulcerative colitis can be treated with anti-inflammatory medication such as corticosteroids and aminosalicylates. Low doses of these drugs can be used to prevent flare-ups. These drugs need to be used correctly, so please consult your pharmacist for advice. In extreme cases surgical treatment, where part of the large intestine is removed, is necessary.

If you are suffering from the symptoms of ulcerative colitis you should

#### Consumer advice

### Shopping tips for your **Christmas list**

IT'S the season to be organised, when doing your Christmas shopping. Trying to buy gifts for everyone can be a bit of a headache. As the big day gets closer the temptation is to panic buy which can lead to things going wrong. It is always best to be prepared... if you can. So here a few tips on how to keep on top of your Christmas... instead of letting it get on top of you!

- 1. Avoid impulse buying by making a list of everyone you wish to buy for and how much you are going to spend on each person. Keep to this list and you are less likely to overspend.
- 2. Start shopping as early as possible to take advantage of pre-Christmas sales and the widest choice. Shopping hours too may vary from normal times so take advantage of this and avoid getting flustered. If some shops open early or stay open late consider visiting them at these times to avoid queues where possible.
- 3. Always shop around. Not only on the high street but on the internet too. Traders can and do charge different prices for the same items. There is nothing wrong in this practice as it is legal.
- 4. Be careful when buying from markets and/or car boot sales. The goods might look okay and you may think you are getting a bargain. However you could find you have bought dodgy or counterfeit goods. Look out for counterfeit goods such as, clothing, CDs, computer games, DVDs this Christmas, which will be of poor quality and not gratefully received as a gift. Also beware of buying cosmetics which could harm the user if they do not meet safety standards for use, causing painful rashes or reactions.
- 5. When internet shopping protect yourself against on-line fraud. Make sure you buy from a secure site. Avoid sending your credit card details by email or over the phone, unless you are sure you know you are dealing with a reputable firm.
- 6. If you buy on-line you will have rights relating to distance selling in most cases. (One of the exceptions being however, perishable goods, such as flower and food items). Check out your online shopping rights BEFORE you buy by logging on to Consumer Direct Scotland. www.consumerdirect.gov.uk/
- 7. If buying on the high street, check out the shop's policy on returning goods. You do not have an automatic right to a refund if you change your mind about the goods you have bought. This is legal. Some shops offer refunds on unsuitable goods while others just offer credit notes or exchanges. Some may not offer anything. Check the time periods for returning unsuitable goods or unwanted gifts. This can vary from shop to shop.
- 8. Keep all receipts. You will need the receipts if some presents are unsuitable and the shop is prepared to offer an exchange. It is always useful to have receipts if you have bought something that is faulty. If you pay by credit card check your receipts against your statements. 9. Take extra care when buying toys. Always check for the CE safety
- mark and make sure the toy is suitable for the child's age.

10 Use cash for small purchases and check your change. Use your credit card for items over £100 for extra protection.


